Our dedicated crisis counselors worked with 615 youth and their families providing crisis intervention, while developing communication and understanding. This 24-hour crisis program empowers youth to make responsible decisions when faced with difficult situations.

"ILP has allowed me to know where my strengths are and what I need help with."

Last year, 71 teens were provided a home by TLP. These young people learned how to live independently and responsibly. Of the teens accepted to the program, 37 were pregnant or teen parents. They all improved their life skills with 55% increasing their level of education. The 18 months of highly individualized training the youth receive more than prepares them for their transition to permanent housing.

Transitional Living Program



Professional Outreach Specialists went to the streets to talk to over 6,110 kids last year. These are kids who are unaware of or reluctant to use existing helping resources. They went to their own neighborhoods, schools, recreation centers, and shopping malls – anywhere teens hang out. The main focus areas of YOP are decreasing youth violence, runaway and homeless youth, alcohol and drug prevention, teen pregnancy and sexual awareness.

Mentoring and Resolving Conflict Positively

MARC+ reached 205 youth who were on the borderline of success or failure. The kids learned alternative solutions for dealing with conflict situations. Teens from middle and high schools learn self-esteem building, conflict resolution techniques and peer social skill building that they were able to use right away.

Huckleberry House counseled 87 families who worked to make their homes safe, healthy places for their children. We know that families need a range of options to address the many pressures they face. This year, 69 teens and their families received community support services.
